# Lake McClure Tournament



### FRESNO BASS CLUB MEMBERS,

Lake McClure in February usually means big fat spotted bass and largemouth eagerly feeding in preparation for the pre-spawn. The weather was beautiful for the last couple of weeks and the warmest weather was set to be on tournament weekend. I was there pre-fishing on Thursday and knew it would be shorts weather by tournament day! I made sure I texted Tim Turner to let him know that shorts would be allowed in February!

My pre-fishing was horrible to say the least. I launched out of McClure Point on Thursday and stayed in the 5-mph zone all day long. I caught two fish over two pounds early then a few small keepers to finish my limit, but my non-boater, Jimmy Arnold only managed one keeper during pre-fish.

This was not the norm for McClure in February, and we were stumped to say the least. The other issue, besides simply getting bit, was where to concentrate your efforts. We caught fish from 0 to 50 foot and everywhere in-between without seeing many fish on the graph. Based upon all of this we knew it was going to be a tough bite.


Tough bite or not, someone always figures them out and there is always a winner. This month's winner was Ron Red Sr. Ron didn't say whether he figured them out or just got lucky and landed on them, but what he said was he moved around a lot throughout the day. Ron said he caught his fish deep early and shallow late in the day. All of Ron's fish came from Piney Creek to the mouth of the river just above Horseshoe. Ron said he caught all his fish on worms but did not elaborate on the technique due to an upcoming tournament. Congratulations Ron on winning this one with an impressive 10.63 lbs. limit anchored by a 3.58 big fish,



Second place went to new club member David Heirendt. David said he caught his first four fish in Piney Creek all before 10:00 am on plastics in 25 feet of water. He threw the plastics Texas rigged with an 1/8 oz weight. His fifth fish came out of Cottonwood on a drop shot in 40 feet of water. Dave caught one last keeper that did not help the cause off a main lake point in 44 feet of water. Overall, he said the bite was tough and he got lucky to catch all good quality fish including his big fish of 2.53 lbs. David's five fish limit tipped the scales at 10.16 lbs. Congratulations David!!



Third place went to another new club member, Cory Kerber. Cory did have time to prefish for the club tournament, but his team partner (me) told him how tough the bite was on Thursday. Cory, coming off a two-day Bass Nation win at New Melones decided he would just go fishing and let the fish tell him what they wanted. Cory found that the better fish for him were in 0-15 on the main lake. Cory fished a 6" Texas rigged Pro Worm to catch his limit. Cory did not want to say too much as he has an upcoming tournament there as well. Cory weighed in five fish for 8.48 lbs. Congratulations Cory!



Rounding out the top five was Jessie Perez Sr. in fourth place who weighed in five fish for 8.27 lbs. and Bob Jones who weighed in five fish for 8.55 lbs. Bob would have had third place, but the dead fish penalty of a half pound knocked him down to 8.05 lbs. and 5<sup>th</sup> place.



It takes a lot of work to make sure these deep caught fish survive and even then, we lose a couple here and there. If you fish for deep fish in tournaments long enough it will happen to you as well.

Bob Jones has been fishing for a long time and is a big advocate of keeping his fish alive and it still happened to him. So, it's very important that we all do our best to fizz our fish and use live-well water treatments to help our fish recover in our live wells.

Earlier this month while fishing the Bass Nation, I was catching my fish out of 45-65 feet. I fizzed every fish I caught immediately after catching them and put them in the live-well. Even though I heard the air escaping when I "fizzed" them, doesn't mean I let enough air out or on the other hand let too much air out. I had to keep checking my fish every 5-10 minutes to ensure they were recovering properly.

If a fish is still floating after your initial "fizz," you have a couple of choices, you can fizz the fish a second time (not recommended in my opinion) or you can utilize "Flip clips" which attach to the fish's Ventral or Pelvic fins not to be confused with the pectoral fins. The Ventral or Pelvic fins are located on the front bottom of the fish while the pectoral fins are located on the side of the fish just rearward of the gill plates.


These weighted clips will force the fish to sit upright in the live-well and allow them to breathe normally versus breathing on their side causing undue stress to the fish. Sometimes one clip is enough, sometimes you may need two clips. Fish can shake the clips off, so you should continue to monitor your fish throughout the day.

If you let too much air out of a fish by squeezing its belly, the fish may lay flat on the bottom of your live-well and may not survive the day. In my opinion, I'd rather not let enough air out and utilize the flip clips than to let too much air out and have the fish laying on the bottom of the live-well for the rest of the day stressed and breathing with only one set of gills.


When fizzing a fish properly, you should do it in the live-well where you can see the air bubbles coming out of the fizzing needle and at the same time feel the fish start to neutralize as air exits its bladder. The fish will be floating and pushing up against your hand initially, but once you let the proper amount of air out of its bladder, you will feel the fish start to neutralize and not push up against your hand as much.

After putting deep caught fish in your live-well, you should always add a water treatment like Rejuvenade to the water to help the fish recover.

At Melones two of my fish were not doing well after being fizzed, I had to take the fish out of my live-well and spend about five minutes trying to revive each fish in the lake water by moving it back and forth in allowing water to flow over their gills. Once I did this, I utilized the flip clips to upright the fish in the live-well and turned my oxygenator and my live-well pumps on high and added some more Rejuvenade to the live-wells. Both fish had already started to lose their color and I was worried they were not going to make it, but both came back to life and survived. By the end of the day all my fish looked great, recovered, and swam away without any problems.




